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
Most maps in the ATLAS are drawn to a scale of 1:6,000,000 (used where one map is given on a single page), 1:8,000,000 (two maps on a single page) or 1:4,000,000 (one map covering two pages). The first two types are drafted in the standard direction, with the north at the top of the page, while the third type is drafted at an oblique angle, the north being indicated below the map to the right.

Remarks:

- 1. Japanese names used in this publication are written with the personal names first and the surnames last, in the Anglicized form.
- 2. Brief explanatory notes in English, French and Spanish for each of the 73 maps on the 48 plates are to be found in the last part of the atlas. These should serve as a simplified account of the geography of Japan.
- 3. In almost all maps in this atlas, except for that on page 1, Etorofu in the north and the Nansei Islands in the south have been omitted, in order to make the scale of the maps as large as possible. For details as to the history and present status of Japanese territories, reference should be made to Part 1 (Japan and its Surroundings) of the text.
- 4. All maps in this Atlas are based on statistical or other reliable material on the various subjects concerned.
