The National Atlas of Sweden

SNA Publishing will publish between 1990 and 1997 a government-financed National Atlas of Sweden. The first national atlas, Atlas över Sverige, was published in 1953-71 by Svenska Sällskapet för antropologi och geografi, SSAG (the Swedish Society for Anthropology and Geography). The new national atlas describes Sweden in seventeen volumes, each of which deals with a separate theme. The organisations responsible for this new national atlas are Lantmäteriverket, LMV (the National Land Survey of Sweden), SSAG and Statistiska centralbyrån, SCB (Statistics Sweden). The whole project is under the supervision of a board consisting of the chairman, Jim Widmark and Sture Norberg (LMV), Staffan Helmfrid and Åke Sundborg (SSAG), Frithiof Billström and Gösta Guteland (SCB) and Leif Wastenson (SNA). To assist the board and the editors there is a scientific advisory group of three permanent members: Professor Staffan Helmfrid (Chairman), Professor Erik Bylund and Professor Anders Rapp. This advisory group co-opts specialists for each theme. A theme manager is responsible for compiling the manuscript for each individual volume. The National Atlas of Sweden is to be published in book form both in Swedish and in English, and in a computer-based version for use in personal computers.

The English edition of the National Atlas of Sweden is published under the auspices of the Royal Swedish Academy of Sciences by the National Committee of Geography with financial support from Knut och Alice Wallenbergs Stiftelse and Marcus och Amalia Wallenbergs Stiftelse.
